The areas we will be targeting are as follows: **Bridleway 93** – running from St. Peter's Church via Aldborough Hatch Farm to Fairlop Waters and the bridge over the Central Line at Barkingside. **The footpath** -St. Peter's Church to the Aldborough Hall Equestrian Centre and **Painters Road Oaks Lane** – the ditch on the north side from Roy Gardens to Chase Lane.

Chase Lane – from Oaks Lane to the bridge over the Central Line and on to the steps down to Sainsbury's The Shrubberies in Aldborough Road North Other areas identified by residents prior to the day Meet at St. Peter's Church Halls from 10am onwards. Working in teams and pairs, you will be issued with a litter picker and plastic sack. First 30 will receive a high visibility jacket. Please wear stout gloves and appropriate footwear.





We have received the following report from Lafarge

Quarry and Landfill Manager's Update

Firstly I would like to introduce myself and my site team. My name is Claudine Russell and I am the Quarry and Landfill Manager for this site, I also run two other quarries in Essex. I have worked in quarrying for 12 years with a break in between when I worked for the Environment Agency. The Quarry Supervisor is Dave Standing. We manage a team of three people on this site – a loading shovel operator, a bulldozer driver and a weighbridge operator. We also manage various contractors.

Fairlop Landfill is currently the busy side of the operation as we are receiving material from Crossrail and other contracts. The Crossrail material is clean clay that will provide us with an excellent base for our stored subsoils and topsoils. We hope to restore a sizeable amount of the Fairlop Area D this summer and then to start on our five year aftercare programme. (This is the area of Aldborough Hall Farm south from Painters Road.)

You may have noticed that we have recently completed our winter works on site. We have removed lots of bramble thickets and tidied up the area. We have also taken out some self-generated willow trees which would have discouraged species diversity in the restoration. We have planted about 1,000 metres of hedging, interspaced with oak trees that will mature over the years. This new hedge will eventually replace the metal fence, which will be removed once our landfilling activities on site have ceased.

We hope to be able to meet some of you during our time on site and would gladly escort groups of interested residents around – both to show you our site activities and to explain our final restoration plans. If you would like to book a visit, please contact me on 020 8598 9089 and we can arrange a mutually convenient time for your visit. You will need to wear sensible footwear, but we can provide high visibility vests and hard hats for your visit. Please do not hesitate to contact me if you would like any further information.
